

Drouin West Fire Station Extensions complete

On 20th July Drouin West CFA held an open day for the community to see the much needed extensions and improvements to Drouin

West Fire Station. Drouin West's first station was built in 1969, and since then has undergone a number of extensions. In the past these works were completed by the Brigade. These most recent, much needed, improvements were made with the support of the CFA through the VESEP program. In July 2019 the extensions were fully completed and the CFA was able to officially handover the station back to the volunteers. The extensions included

- A dedicated Breathing Apparatus room.
- Separate male and female change rooms.
- An Office & Administration area
- Disabled access, including a disabled toilet
- A new Motor Room to house their tanker, slipon and field command vehicle.

Brendan Witt, Drouin West Captain said "The focus of these improvements was to create a safe workplace for our volunteers. I am pleased to say that the works have achieved this. They will also allow us to meet the demands of the ever growing communities of Drouin West and Jindivick that the Brigade is responsible for." The Brigade will soon be connected to the Internet as part of the Internet rollout pilot program, thereby bringing your station up to date.

The Brigade thanked Bruce Rowley and his team for supporting Drouin West and facilitating the build, along with one of its members, Kevin Armstrong who took on the role of Project Manager on behalf of the Brigade.

Nangara Notes - Winter Sightings

Don't cross Nangara off your list of places to visit just because it's a bit cold! You may discover:



Dusty Miller, a green-grey shrub, well represented throughout Nangara Reserve and nearby Bunyip State Park where in some places it is particularly prolific. Dusty Miller has begun flowering and will continue to do so for several more months. The flowers will attract

insects, making it a valuable part of the food web in Nangara. Various forms of Dusty Miller have been commercially produced for the home garden and are available in any good native plant nursery.

Mountain Correa, another shrub or sometimes small tree that has begun flowering. It is distributed spasmodically through the eastern ranges and in a few places is called locally abundant. The best places to see Mountain Correa in Nangara



Reserve are along Boundary Track at the northern edge of the reserve, and near the top of Bunyip Link.

Tall Greenhood Orchids. A few winter flowering greenhood orchids are beginning to appear. Tall Greenhoods have been appearing for some weeks and will continue to flower for the next month or two. These orchids are quite common throughout Victoria, and there are several variations. In places, Tall Greenhoods can reach 80cm but the Nangara variety seldom grows more the 30 or 40cm.





Eastern Yellow Robin always provide some winter colour in Nangara. These little birds are year-round residents in the reserve and

Drouin West Fire Brigade - Time to clean up and burn

off. With spring in the air, it won't be that long till we welcome the warm days of summer. The predictions are for a long, dry summer ahead so now is the ideal time to prepare for the potential threat of fires this summer. All residents who live in the Jindivick area are at risk of fire; either from the forest or grass. Prepare your property for fire risk before summer starts and get any burning off completed before the fire restrictions are announced by the council. Consider the need to create fuel breaks around your property and remove fuel, trash and combustibles near the assets you wish to protect. 
Anne was colourful, talented, good natured, positive, a monument of warmth, and a beautiful person.

More opportunities to shape the future of Jindivick township – HAVE YOUR SAY!

(Please refer to the map on the previous page. It has been provided by Matthew Robinson of Baw Baw Shire, and was developed after a community consultation meeting held in the Hall on 18 July, 2019)

Matthew has provided the following information about the **Baw Shire 'Placemaking' Project**:

Jindivick is one of the four communities selected by the Shire to implement a 'Placemaking' plan. Each community has a project budget of \$50,000 and the objective of the project is to:

- Work with the community to develop a placemaking project that has a positive impact,
- Add to the physical and social character of the township, and
- Bolster a commitment from Council to communities outside of the major townships.

Through consultation with the School, the Cricket Club, the Jindivick Progress Association, and the Hall Committee, some ideas surrounding the main street (Jacksons Track), including parking and drainage improvements, have been compiled.

Wildlife DNA in farm dams across Jindivick & Neerim District – the big reveal! (Report by Helen Barclay)
On July 16, 40 locals huddled from the cold, warmed by hot soups (thanks Jindi Caf') at the Jindivick Hall. While the 'big reveal' night marked the end of the farm dam DNA biodiversity project, it marked the beginning of a

Over two citizen science days in November 2018 and April this year, more than 110 eDNA water samples were collected from across 18 farm dams.

new found interest in farm dam wildlife.

Melbourne company EnviroDNA, teamed up with Jindivick Landcare and Neerim District Landcare groups to make this innovative project happen. With the efforts of 30 locals and landholders the project has provided an

exciting insight into wildlife relying on farm dams. All up, 60 different species were identified, including 41 native wildlife, 13 invasive wildlife, and of course, livestock and domestic animals.

Most excitingly, the blue billed duck, an endangered species, was detected at two farm dams across both surveys. (report continues p. 7)



Wildlife DNA in farm dams across Jindivick & Neerim District – the big reveal! (continued from p.6)



Birds made up the majority of the wildlife count, with 27 different species. There were also 13 mammal species including the platypus and the Australian water rat, even the southeastern free tailed bat ,and a sugar glider. A couple of crayfish species, a range of fish species and the eastern long necked turtle helped to round up the count!

Agriculture and wildlife conservation can co-exist!

The number and diversity of species detected helps to demonstrate that farm dams can provide an important resource for wildlife as extra habitat, refuges, or "stepping stones". With scarce water and habitat fragmentation in agricultural landscapes, dams are an opportunity for more ecological farming practices. Landholders have the opportunity to improve their farm dams not just for productivity purposes but to also support wildlife. Along with fencing out stock from dams, providing habitat in and around dams, such as logs, rocks and wetland plants are great ways to encourage and support wildlife.

At the reveal night, we heard from Gabe Marsden of Habitat Creations, who noted the importance of selecting the right plants for your dam considering things like depth of water – ask a local nursery for advice.

What is eDNA you ask?

Every creature leaves traces of their DNA in their surrounding environment, through skin cells, hair, scales, and other bodily secretions. This is an exciting new, non-invasive way to detect wildlife in its environment. You can learn more about it at www.envirodna.com.
