Nangara Notes The Brown Thornbill



This little sedentary bird is ever-present in Nangara Reserve. It is nearly always first detected by its rolling 'pee-orr' song or a harsh buzzing warning call. Brown Thornbills tend to occupy the mid and

lower strata of forest, flitting through the shrubbery and low tree branches in small family parties, sometimes with other similar species. They eat insects and larvae mainly but will also take seeds and fruits at times. Often regarded as just a 'little brown bird', or LBB, Brown Thornbills have a charm that often makes them a favourite among bird watchers. Basically olive-brown or brown-grey all over, the Brown Thornbill does not boast a colourful plumage, but is set apart from similar species

such as the Striated
Thornbill, Brown Gerygone
and the scrub-wrens, by the
dark scallops on a tan
forehead, dark streaking on
the chest and the large darkred eye. Brown Thornbills
build an untidy dome-



shaped nest of bark, grasses and strands of ferns, held together with cobweb.

The garden at **Broughton Hall** will remain open until 15 December, due to popular demand. It is a great season in the garden (see right) Call and spend the day soaking up the beauty. Industrial Action at Jindi Cheese News of a workers' strike and picket line at the Lactalis's Jindi Cheese factory has reached state and national press. The following information has been sourced, with permission, from The Warragul and Drouin Gazette. Photos also generously provided by The Gazette Staff at the factory have been asking for pay equity with colleagues employed at Lactalis's Longwarry and Rowville plants.

About 2/3 of the staff, largely women, took industrial action on 13 November after ongoing enterprise bargaining agreement negotiations failed They formed a picket line in the hope of disrupting production and making their voices heard. Staff involved undertook to stop asking trucks to not cross the line when advised they would be taken to Fair Work Australia if they continued to do so.

At the time of writing another meeting was to be held in late November.

The Editor contacted Lactalis's Australian Headquarters for comment and was authorised to report the following comment: "Lactalis declined to comment"
