
Activities will include a business workshop, basketball, teen yoga, soccer, bootcamp, dance classes, discount entry to the Warragul Leisure Centre and much more!

**Nangara Notes – The Eastern Yellow Robin**

The Eastern Yellow Robin could well be described as Baw Baw’s iconic bird. It can be seen or heard in the wet forest gullies, in the drier open woodlands and sometimes in parks and private gardens. It has two distinct calls; a rather explosive ‘tchew-tchew’, and a succession of softer piping single pitch notes.



The Eastern Yellow Robin is a true eastern-seaboard species, found in the coastal bush and ranges from mid north Queensland to south eastern South Australia. Its flitting-undulating flight and sideways perching on tree trunks are often give away characteristics, making it easy to identify.

The tracks of Nangara Reserve provide near perfect habitat for this bird as it scans the more open ground for a tasty morsel. It often has a charming accommodating attitude to human presence, continuing to go about its business while being observed from just a few metres distance.

Nangara’s Eastern Yellow Robins will begin nesting shortly. They build a cup-shaped nest of bark and grass, lined with moss and cobweb and camouflaged with lichen. (see left) Often, they choose a prickly shrub like Prickly Currant Bush in which



to place their nest. Eastern Yellow Robin fledglings – just out of the nest – look nothing like their parents, instead having motley rufous-brown plumage. (see right) Many Eastern Yellow Robins are altitudinal migrants; they spend summer in the alps and winter in the lower country, but Nangara Reserve has these bush-beauties all year-round.

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**Creative Harvest 2020** The Creative Harvest Open Gardens is on again next January, and we are seeking expressions of interest to participate from both suitable garden owners and from artists. Creative Harvest is run annually by the Baw Baw Sustainability Network. Productive and inspirational food gardens in West Gippsland are open to the public and will team up with local artists to showcase their work on the weekend of January 18 and 19, 2020. The event is designed to show people gardens that grow food well so they can learn from the experiences of others. It’s a great opportunity to meet like-minded people to share ideas. The gardens range from suburban

house backyards to large acreages with plenty of room for lots of fruit and vegetables. They also include community gardens and organic commercial enterprises.

The gardens will feature working artists with their art work for sale. Last year artists included painters, textile workers, mosaicists, macramé artists, sculptors, jewellers and a children’s author.

**Baw Baw Shire 'Placemaking' Project.** Jindivick is one of 4 Communities selected by the Shire where a 'Place Making' plan will be implemented. Each community has a project budget of \$50,000, and the objective of this project is to:

- Work with communities in the Shire's minor townships to develop placemaking projects that have a positive impact,
- Add to the physical and social character of these townships, and
- Bolster a commitment from Council to communities outside of the major townships.

In recent months there has been some consultation with the community through the School, The Cricket Club, the JPA and the Hall Committee about what could be done in Jindivick. At a recent meeting of the Hall Committee, where Shire representatives were present, it was agreed that further collaboration was needed. Council will, in collaboration with Jindivick residents, produce a plan of the main street that identifies the numerous issues that have been raised and utilise the place making funds to address the biggest priorities. Issues that have been raised so far include drainage, parking in the main street, the shop area, the school and at the cricket ground, and extending the bridle trail from the corner of West Jindivick Rd to Stoll Rd.

### Drouin West Fire Brigade - Electrical safety in the home

Electrical appliances including double adaptors, power boards and extension cords are a major cause of fires. Using damaged electrical equipment and appliances can result in a fire, only use appliances in good working order.

- Turn off all electrical appliances at the power point when not in use
  - Don't use double adaptors
  - Only use power boards according to manufacturers' instructions, never overload and check regularly for damage
  - Ensure monitors, laptops, televisions and other equipment have good air flow around them and are not in confined spaces or covered.
- ▶▶ Only use certified electrical trades people to repair damaged/faulty electrical appliances, wiring or equipment
