



Community joins Drouin West Fire Brigade in the Community Bushfire Exercise

Despite the recent cold, wet weather, the fire season will soon be upon us and your local CFA Brigade is working to help residents prepare for a predicted long, hot summer. We wish to thank those who turned up to support the bushfire community exercise on Sunday 27th October, where around 65 people gathered in the Jindivick Hall to learn more about fire behaviour.

CFA Community Safety organiser, John Legione led the discussion about the unique fire risks in this area and then people worked in small groups through a hands-on mapping exercise that considered the potential of a bushfire threat confronting the township/region of Jindivick this summer. It was realistic and we want to thank the other supporting agencies involved on the day; Scott and Michael (DELWP), Glenn (Vic Police), Faye (Red Cross), Vicki (Baw Baw Shire) and the catering provided by Mark and crew form the Jindivick Cricket Club as well as Brigade members who volunteered their time on a weekend to help make our community safer.

For those unable to make the session who want to know more about what should go in a bushfire plan (whether leaving early OR staying to defend) please search for the Plan and Prepare resources listed on-line at <u>https://www.cfa.vic.gov.au</u> or:email the Brigade with your details (<u>secretary@dwrfb.org.au</u>) and we can arrange an on-site visit from our members to meet you as part of

our Property Advice Visit Service. We also have a stall at the Jindivick Market so come up and say hello if you need advice on your bushfire planning.

With the fire danger period already in place in Wellington and East Gippsland shires, it is likely that the Fire Danger Period may be declared for Baw Baw Shire over the coming weeks. Keep an ear out for announcements in the local news. But before then – CLEAN UP! The next few weeks provide a great chance to rake up the trash in the garden, clean out the gutters, and burn off those bonfires. Please don't forget to register your burn off by phoning the CFA on 1800 668 511.
