In modern homes where the parents' bedroom is often in another part of the house, they may not hear the smoke alarm in the children's bedrooms A quarter of all house fires resulting in death or serious injury start in bedrooms, the majority between midnight and 4 am. Most fatalities occur in July and August, so winter is a critical time for you to be aware

#### Nangara Notes

Nangara Reserve is particularly quiet at present. The birds haven't begun their springtime choruses yet and the Forest Boronia, Xmas Bush and wattles are yet to bud up. Even the fungi are a bit scarce unless you get right off the track. How-

ever its still a great spot to do some 'nature bathing', a pastime recognised around the world as therapy for health and well-being and don't we need some of that right now? (Leave the mobile phones and iPads at home). Look hard enough though and you might find evidence



that the season might soon be on the change.

Here and there some sundews are starting to show. Sundews of course are carnivorous plants, partly at least. Long tentacles protrude from their leaves, each with a sticky gland at the tip. These droplets look like dew glistening in the sun, thus their name. The glands produce nectar to attract insect prey, powerful adhesive to trap it, and enzymes to digest it. Once an insect becomes stuck, nearby tentacles coil around the insect and smoth-

er it.

Australia has well over 200 species of carnivorous plants, more than any other country.

Along Boundary Track at the north of the reserve you might spot a Tall Greenhood orchid. We have about 8 or 10 species of Tall Greenhoods in Victoria and I think the one currently in flower in Nangara Reserve is *Pter*ostylis melograma.

Sometimes they will grow as high as 80cm and have up to 20 flowerheads. Even so, they can be hard to spot sometimes, being virtually all green, almost translucent and relatively delicate and slender. Tall Greenhoods are very widespread and can vary a bit in appearance. Tall Greenhoods are endemic to eastern Australia and they flower from May to November.

Jindivick Cricket Club held its 2020 Annual General Meeting on June 12 and elected the following Office Bearers: President: Paul Beaumont 0418340677




