Damage to beautiful Strzelecki gum (see left) This grand old giant seems to have come to the end of its days. One of only two remaining on the Jackson's Track frontage in the township area, it is a Strzelecki gum, an endangered species and endemic to this specific area. It suffered some wind damage in the recent storm and was deemed at risk by the Shire and so 'made safe'. A possible contributing factor is the recent footpath and guttering works immediately beside the tree. When the Jindivick Progress Association built the original footpath along to Kydd Park Reserve about 15 years ago, the advice was to stay away from these old trees and so the path ended some distance away. When these new works were planned we were assured the trees would be OK.

The Eastern Whipbird

There wouldn't be many sounds of the Australian bush in our region more iconic than the call of the whipbird. The male makes a series of low whistles that rises into a long drawn out single note ending in a sharp, resounding 'whipcrack'. The female answers almost immediately with two sharp 'choo-choo'

notes. You could be forgiven for believing the calls were coming from a single bird.

The territorial call of the Eastern Whipbird is the best and sometimes only indicator of the bird's presence. Whipbirds tend to remain well hidden in the wet gullies where they feed on insects and larvae in the leaf litter. Established pairs hold permanent year-round territories – there are at least two established pairs in the bottom section of Nangara reserve and one or two more in the northern section.

The Eastern Whipbird is about the size of a Noisy Miner. It is olive green and black with a white patch on the cheeks and throat and it has a small crest on its crown. It is distributed through wet forest regions of the eastern seaboard from Melbourne to about Cooktown in Queensland.

Some references declare the bird is a shy species but it only takes a little patience to sit quietly within their range and the birds will become curious and approach quite closely. There are some locations where whipbirds regularly visit occupied picnic grounds in the hope of a

small scrap of food.
The Eastern Whipbird is an Australian endemic and is listed as secure in Victoria, but of course is vulnerable to processes resulting in loss of habitat – logging, land clearing, etc.

Press release from Baw Baw Shire

Jindivick's picturesque Kydd Parke Reserve is set to receive a \$480,000 upgrade to improve the oval's playing surface and ensure cricketers can enjoy a full season at the ground.

The upgrade includes: installation of new drainage and irrigation, establishment of a bore water supply, and the reinstatement of a drought-tolerant grass. The existing retaining wall will also be extended to improve stability and new perimeter fencing installed.

Council's 2020/21 Capital Works Program includes \$380,000 for the project, with an additional \$100,000 contributed through the Victorian Government's Community Cricket Program.

Kydd Parke is home to Jindivick Cricket Club, one of the biggest cricket clubs in Baw Baw Shire. The oval's current poor drainage means the club usually has a wet start to the season, often unable to play at its home ground for the first few matches, and needs to find alternate venues to host its six teams. Once complete, the upgrades will allow the club to play early season home games, and improve the chance of play in poor weather.

It will allow the club to deliver its routine maintenance schedule, which is frequently hampered in winter beccause of the inability to get machinery on to the oval. Kydd Parke Reserve's thriving community garden will also benefit from a sustained water supply.

It is expected that works will commence early 2021.

Jindivick Cricket Club's response

Kydd-Parke Reserve is a wonderful community asset. One of the most important aspects of any public space is the quality of the surface, and we are really pleased that a number of cards have fallen into place allowing a major upgrade to take place. A partnership between the Baw Baw Shire, Cricket Australia and the State Government has enabled this project to happen. We have made council aware of the reserve's usage over many years and we're pleased they are recognising the current use and potential of this facility.

We hope that the work on the oval will allow everyone to properly access this facility all year round. Both active and passive users will benefit. It will also open up fresh opportunities for user groups, and further stimulate the local economy through increased visitation. Kydd-Parke Reserve is one of a few sports grounds people choose to go to as a destination in itself, due to its glorious views, serene setting and self-contained layout.

Baw Baw shire employees Shane Paynter and David McMahon have been very accessible over several years and were instrumental in several key areas, including planning and the vital aspect of marrying up funding opportunities from different sources. Thanks also to Councillors Keith Cook and Trish Jones for their support in various forums along the way.
