


Autumn at Broughton Hall is a stunning time of year. Bring a picnic and some friends, stay for a while and enjoy the beautiful colours and scenery

Jindivick Cricket Club - How we fared in season 2020-21

Corona virus hit all aspects of community life last year including the Jindi Cricket Club. The border between West Gippsland and Melbourne cut off the usual supply of players and coaches, and the club adopted a streamlined model, cutting back to three senior sides and two junior sides.

The club brought up its promising younger players to fill the gaps in the seniors. It was a slog at times, but there was real growth happening and flashes of brilliance. Regular Div 2 players like Jordan Smith and Sean Viotto were still around. Jordan had several great performances; a dominant 127 vs Iona, a 7 wicket game against Western Park, and another 5 later in the season. Sean crafted a beautiful 50 in the last game. Promising young players who came through the junior ranks, like Harrison Moore, Jack Braddick and James Keogh, led a group of youngsters who showed they were deserving of their place. The Jindi Club is confident that this side will grow into a potent cricket team.

Our second and third sides both performed well. Jindi Division 4 has enjoyed a lot of success in that grade over many years, with several premierships and many grand final appearances. This season it was stopped at the final hurdle before the grand final by a handful of runs. Matt Ward made regular big scores and bagged League Player of the Year, League Champion Player, and Jindivick Club Champion. Andrew Pyle amassed 31 wickets at an average of 15.23 In Division 6, Jindi was proud to field a side all season, unlike many clubs who forfeited a lot. This is traditionally our dads and kids grade and we have a great time. Forfeits, a bye, the five day lockdown and weather events slammed the Jindi Div 6 path to finals after Christmas. In the end it was stranded outside of the top four.

Our Under 16's partnered with Neerim and reached the Grand Final. We have some really promising youngsters like James Keogh, Fletcher Pallot and Flynn Pearson, who all play seniors in the afternoons. We also fielded an under 12 side and will be reintroducing our under 14's next season.

Jindivick joined the Victorian Cricket Association Veterans Over 50's competition this season (see photo below)

Onwards: The club is currently speaking to coaches and looking at recruitment. We plan to appoint a head coach and specialists in batting, bowling, and fielding. There's still time to get on board.

Anita's Pasta with Tuna and Lemon

This is without doubt the go-to meal when you don't know what to cook.

Made simply with pantry and deli ingredients, you'll have dinner made in a flash.....Buon Appetito

400g spaghetti, penne or linguine pasta

1 large onion - finely sliced

2 tablespoons of olive oil

Large tin of tuna chunks in olive oil - drained

1 cup chopped black olives

1 tablespoon capers chopped

1 or 2 juiced lemons with the bits

Roughly a tablespoon or more of chopped parsley, basil or dill (if you haven't any of these herbs it doesn't matter) and some black pepper

Cook the onion in the oil on low heat until lightly caramelised

Add the tuna, olives, capers, give it a stir, let it cook for about a minute, then turn heat off.

Cook the pasta, drain (save some pasta water)

Add pasta to the tuna mix.

Add the lemon juice, give it a stir, add a bit of pasta water (this helps loosen the mix) and a little extra olive oil.

Garnish with finely chopped parsley and a good grind of black pepper.

Serves 4

Nangara News Crested Shrike-tit

In spite of its outlandish crest and bright colours, the Crested Shrike-tit can be hard to see. Generally, it's more likely to give away its presence with its call



- a drawn-out and sad 'peeer-peeer' that seems to be coming from far, but in fact may be quite close. Another give away for the Crested Shrike-tit is the tearing noise

made as it rips off strips of bark with its powerful bill in search for spiders and insects.



If you catch a quick glimpse of black, white and yellow you may confuse the Crested Shrike-tit with the Golden Whistler. The male Golden Whistler has a white throat, an all-black head and face, and it doesn't have a crest. Crested Shrike-tits are endemic to Australia where

three races reside. They can be found in open eucalypt woodlands, forests and sometimes rainforest. Anecdotally, the bird might be adapting to urban woodlands and parks and gardens – there are several localities in Drouin where Crested Shrike-tits can be found.

Normally Crested Shrike-tits feed high in the canopy but at this time of year it is not unusual for them to be found at eye-level.

The Crested Shrike-tit builds a cup-shaped nest of leafy twigs high in the canopy, often in the flimsiest of branches, perhaps to deter heavy predators. Their nest is a favourite target for Brush and Fan-tailed Cuckoos to parasitize.

Friends of Drouin's Trees





Locals become environmental DNA scientists for a day, helping to show that small waterways in our region are important for wildlife.

In March Jindivick Hall played host to more than 40 Jindivick and Neerim district locals keen to hear the latest results from eDNA wildlife surveys that many conducted themselves. This time locals focused on collecting samples from small tributaries running through private properties into the Tarago reservoir. Rehabilitating and looking after such waterways in agricultural landscapes is not only important for water quality but also biodiversity, as this project highlighted.

More than 50 different wildlife species were detected across two tributaries in Neerim district and Jindivick - all thanks to the DNA they left behind in the waterways. Platypus expert, Josh Griffiths of EnviroDNA, was particularly pleased to report on the detection of platypus. Platypuses (yes this is the plural!) will spend most of their time foraging in creeks and building burrows in banks, but it is also likely that they swim into the Tarago reservoir to forage for food. Another animal that (surprisingly) is present on our doorsteps, is the Rakali. (see below)

While commonly known as a water rat, this is not your typical rodent foraging in your compost. This semi-aquatic Australian mammal with a glossy coat and white tip on its tail, spends time in and around waterways and is often mistaken for platypus when duck-diving. Also incredibly, one of world's smallest flying mammals was detected in water samples - the adorable Feathertail glider measuring up to just 8cm.



From the cute and cuddly to those with external skeleton and nippy: a range of burrowing crayfish species (see left) were detected. These little creatures dig extensive tunnels underground and into watercourses. They are rarely seen and hard to survey so to identify at least 4 different species is an incredible outcome from this citizen science project. Across all the tributary sampling sites the wildlife species detected included 4 frogs, 25 birds (1-2 invasive), 13 mammals (4-5 invasive), 5



fish (1 invasive), 2 reptiles, and 6 decapods (burrowing crayfish, yabbie and a shrimp). Please contact Helen at Hbarclay@envirodna.com or 0410123405 if you'd like to see the full report.

Neerim South Primary School and Jindivick Primary School students also became environmental scientists for an afternoon taking samples in their own school ponds and the Neerim South Wetlands. Many different bird species were detected as well as fish, frog species and a reptile species.

Great work to all involved! eDNA is an innovative wildlife detection technology even for seasoned environmental professionals – so to have our community involved and undertaking the sampling has been a real treat!
