Anita's Chocolate, Seed and Nut Balls

These are a great alternative if you're catering for someone who is dairy free or egg free.

Excellent too if you're wanting to reduce the sugar in your lockdown treats.

50 g pumpkin seeds, 50 g sunflower seeds, 100 g of mixed unsalted nuts 50 g desiccated coconut 40 g cocoa powder 10 dates – remove seeds 2 tablespoons honey 2 tablespoons water

Pinch of salt

Some extra desiccated coconut

Pop the lot in a food processor. Blend, form into balls and roll in the extra desiccated coconut

Nangara Notes

Nesting time

Australia's birds build a variety of nests from a broad range of materials. Magpie Larks, White-winged Choughs, Welcome Swallows all use mud as the principal material to construct a nest. Magpies, Butcherbirds

(right), Ravens and Currawongs use sticks to build a basic nest structure. Wrens, finches and robins all use fine grasses and strips of plant material. Many small bush birds use spider web, animal hair, mosses and lichens to make and line their nests.



The beautiful little Spotted Pardalote digs a nest tunnel in soft earth while all our parrots and cockatoos, treecreepers and others, need a tree hollow to breed.



The Nangara iconic Eastern Yellow Robin (left) makes a cup-shaped nest of fine bark and grasses which it camouflages with the bark or lichen of the bush or shrub it has chosen for its location. Many small birds are masters

of camouflage.

Dome-shaped nests appear to be the favourite architectual choice of Brown Thornbills, Superb Fairywrens (right) and Red-browed Finches.



The Jacky

Winter (left) builds a tiny platform nest of grasses and fibres bound with spider web blended into a horizontal fork. Part of his scientific name,

Microeca, means 'small house'. It could be said the Jacky Winter's form of camouflage is minimalism.

Varied Sittellas (right) use vertical tree forks into which they blend their nest.

Brown Gerygone's are relatively re-

cent arrivals to this district. Something seems to be driving the natural distribution of this bird further south - climate change? For the last three or four seasons at least, Brown Gerygone's have built their marvellous nest of bark, fibres and grasses, suspended from a fine branch in the main gully at Nagara.



The diminutive Mistletoebird (left) uses fine plant fibres and spider web to build a nest shaped like a baby's booty. The Mistletoebird suspends its nest from a slender twig. The whole structure appears very fragile. It is this time of year in Nangara Reserve to keep an eye out for a bird carrying some nesting materials, or even just flying con-

stantly to and from the one location.
