JANUARY 2022

2021 didn't pan out quite as anticipated 12 months ago So what did happen in Jindivick last year? (see p.2 for listing of Regular Events)

January: Over the holiday break works were completed at Jindivick Primary School: external painting and artificial turf surrounding the school buildings – no more triphazards! Two off-grid Jindivick gardens on Stoll Rd opened to many enthusiastic visitors, as part of the Baw Baw Sustainability Network's annual Creative Harvest weekend, and Lucky Clucker 500 took a less than enjoyable seaside holiday

Cafe in Warragul. Peter Ware led another informative, interesting tour of the Nangarra Reserve, starting with a chat about a tiger snake. Tiger snakes also featured in their own newsletter item.

March: 3 Drouin West CFA firefighters visited Jindivick Primary School students for 'Thank a Firey Day'. All had a wonderful time playing with water.

April: Jindivick artist Joan Price held her first solo exhibit at Red Tree Gallery. The JPA held an extremely successful Country Market in the Hall and surrounds, and Musker's at Broughton Hall, stunning in its Autumn colours, reopened to visitors.

Despite light rain, the 2021 Jindivick Anzac Day Service was attended by many locals including veterans, representatives of Emergency Services, and Cr. Tricia Jones. Anita's Apricot Chutney

Many years ago, when our boys were little, we had a summer holiday in Port Fairy.

In the garden where we were staying was an apricot tree. The weather was hot, so the scent from the fruit permeated through the air. So tempting was it to help ourselves.....restraint was needed.

Apricots always hold a special place in my heart, a happy memory of a summer long ago.

1.5 kg. apricots, pitted, quartered.

500 g. red onions peeled and finely chopped 375g. packet sunbeam sultanas

600 g. brown sugar 2 cups apple cider vinegar 1 teaspoon each of chilli powder, turmeric and cinnamon

1.5 teaspoons of salt 2 teaspoons of mustard seeds



Place all the ingredients in a large pan and mix together. Bring to boil then reduce heat and simmer for about an hour uncovered.

Its ready when the juice has thickened.

Bottle in sterilized jars.

Best not eaten immediately as the flavour will improve after a couple of days.



Nangara Notes

Victorian Christmas Bush

The mint bush or *Prostanthera* family of shrubs consists

of about 100 species, all endemic to Australia. The Victorian Christmas Bush, *P.lasianthos*, is the largest, being often described as a small tree. At the moment in Nangara, the patches of Victorian Christmas Bush are in full



flower. You will easily find the trees either side of the main track, just inside the main gate. Some of the 'hairy' purple and white flower-heads are beginning to drop, sur-

rounding the base of the trees in a blanket of 'snow'. (Lasianthos means hairy flower). The flowers have a slight honey fragrance.

Prostanthera lasianthos prefers to grow in wet forest habitats from southern Qld to Tas. There is some variation in the species depending on where it grows. In Victoria, the plant begins to flower in December, just in time for Christmas.



Insects and birds are attracted to the flowers and if you have a garden with enough room, it can be cultivated, is fairly hardy, and there are several cultivars available.

Friends of Drouin's Trees

PS: Nearby Holey Plains State Park south of Rosedale is the <u>only</u> location where another very rare and special Prostanthera grows – the Wellington Mint Bush, *Prostanthera galbraithiae* after the naturalist Jean Galbraith of Tyers.

Jindivick Cricket Club-/ Kydd-Parke Reserve News Ground Upgrade

Jindi residents and watchers will have seen the temporary fencing appear at the reserve. This relates to the ground upgrade news we were delighted to share quite a few months back.

After 10 January there will be no access to the playing surface, the nets and parts of the surrounds, as heavy machinery and a worksite will take over. Work on drainage, irrigation, replacement fencing and retaining wall will be taking place.

The work is projected to take three months, so this is obviously going to impact cricket club life as well as other users of the oval and clubrooms.

We are still unsure of how large the worksite will be and are monitoring this as the rest of the fencing goes up. However we are certain that this temporary disruption will lead to a great result for the community in the not-too-distant future.

The CFA declares the Fire Danger Period (FDP) for each municipality (shire or council) at different times in the lead up to the fire season, based on local conditions. The Fire Danger Period for Baw Baw Shire has been declared to start from midnight on the 10th January and will continue until the midnight on the 1st May 2022. The Fire Danger Period is NOT the same thing as a **Total Fire Ban.**
