Great care has been taken with the selection of tree fern and bracken fronds, sword grass, small eucalypt and acacia branches, all native species of this area.

Eventually the realisation dawning, his youngest daughter would need him during her final years of secondary school. His solution fight. Dress as a soldier, camouflage everything, remember every day to fight

the war against depression. Don't ask for help but help others, live simply, display a cheerful outlook. Appear rough around the edges, then only your friends will seek your company.

He remains hidden within view where only his dogs truly see through all the camouflage and love him unconditionally.

Baw Baw Shire Council will host a series of in-person and online workshops as part of a Pre-Election Candidate Development Program being delivered by the Victorian Local Government Association (VLGA) in June and July.

The sessions will cover a range of topics including the basics of becoming a Councillor, election campaign essentials, the importance of codes of conduct, legal and regulatory obligations, and so much more.

With Local Government Councillor elections approaching in October this year, now is the time to start considering if a career as a local Councillor is the path for you.

Details to the sessions can be found below:

Wednesday 26 June - Becoming a Councillor

This introductory module covers all the foundations of becoming a Councillor. Candidates will learn about their legal and regulatory obligations, participatory decision-making, the importance of Codes of Conduct and essential community leadership skills that promote and model good governance.

Time: 6.00pm -8.00pm Venue: Online Monday 1 July - Life as a Woman Councillor

In these sessions, women candidates in the region will be provided with an opportunity to hear from previous women councillors about their experiences representing local community. From standing for office, to getting elected and serving as a councillor, the unique experiences of women will be shared in an informal and relaxed environment promoting discussion and sharing of ideas. Tanja Kovac and Dr Maree Overall will facilitate these sessions.

Thursday 4 July - Life as a Woman Councillor Time: 6.00pm - 8.00pm Venue: Online

Monday 15 July - Becoming a Councillor and Election Campaign Essentials

This four-hour workshop includes an introductory module that covers all the foundations of becoming a Councillor. Candidates will learn about their legal and regulatory obligations, participatory decision-making, the importance of Codes of Conduct and essential community leadership skills that promote and model good governance. Candidates will then be introduced to the importance of recognising and representing the diverse people, views and needs within the community. The module explores effective campaign techniques, canvassing, as well as developing and using communications and social media to reach community members.

Time: 10.00am-12.00pm & 1.00-3.00pm Venue: Fountain Room at West Gippsland Arts Centre Baw Baw Shire Mayor Cr Annemarie McCabe encouraged community members to attend the local sessions and spoke highly of her own experiences as a Councillor.

"Being a Councillor gives you a unique opportunity to make a real difference in your own community and I have absolutely loved the chance to get to know my fellow residents," Cr McCabe said.

"It has been a very rewarding experience in many ways, from decision making, attending events, meeting people and advocating on behalf of our community, to name a few.

In addition to these events, the Municipal Association of Victoria (MAV) will organise and deliver 15 hybrid Community and Candidate Information Sessions across Victoria, including three in Gippsland. These sessions will be held in Bairnsdale on Wednesday 24 July, Leongatha on Thursday 25 July and Morwell on Monday 12 August. Baw Baw Shire Council CEO, Mark Dupe, will be part of the panel discussion at the Leongatha and Morwell sessions.

A walk track of sand and gravel had been formed high above the tide. It was an easy stroll for mother and toddler in a pram. The deep blue of the sky made it difficult to see the hidden horizon as the ocean matched its colour. Only the odd white cap made you aware of the difference. As the young mum neared the end of the walkway a spout of water was evident in the distance. She had hoped the migrating whales would be visible travelling south along the coast. She hurried to a good vantage point. The little tot had yet to see the pod just off shore. As he was lifted from the stroller a large hump back whale breached so close the spray wet his face. Suddenly his eyes focused on the magnificent creature. Too young to know about whales, but the vision was not lost on his tiny mind. He squealed with delight, waving hands and clapping loudly every time the whale and her friends surfaced. It was almost a performance especially for the young child. His first experi-

ence and sighting was to remain indelibly printed on his memory. The clapping and squealing seemed to encourage new players to the game. As they dived and rose again the pod was actually so close it felt like they could be touched. The little boy's eyes were firmly fixed on their display. Watching intently he did not realise the large creatures were actually moving along the coast. Sadly, after an hour the hump backs had almost disappeared from view. Now the little chap burst into tears, sobbing uncontrollably. "Mummy please bring back the big fish back". Still heart broken he added "I love them so much, they need me to feed them". The reaction of her young son had a profound effect on the mother. She had loved and witnessed this migration many times but never through the eyes of a toddler. As she comforted her son, his crying stopped and he asked "when could I see them again?" I promise, "Every year my darling".



Draft Community Local Law now open for community feedback Published on 07 June 2024

Following extensive community consultation undertaken in March this year, Baw Baw Shire Council has created a new Draft Community Local Law, which is now on public exhibition and open for feedback. A Community Local Law guides Council's compliance activities, including property upkeep, construction sites, the management of animals and the general amenity of the Shire.

In March this year, nearly 50 people shared their thoughts and ideas on Baw Baw's Community Local Law and Council has used this feedback to refresh and develop a new draft Community Local Law. During this initial stage of community consultation respondents made suggestions related to animal management across the Shire, as well as open space in Baw Baw and the local environment. This feedback then influenced some changes to the local law, which is now out for its next round of feedback.

Baw Baw Shire Mayor Cr Annemarie McCabe said she was pleased to see how many people gave their feedback during the first phase of consultation earlier this year.

"This feedback has been used to help shape the new draft and we are interested to hear if we have hit the mark," Cr McCabe said.

"As a Council we're focussed on increasing our community engagement as much as we can to ensure that our community's views and ideas are at the centre of everything we do.

"Our Community Local Law does impact our residents so I would encourage everyone to view this draft version and have their say during the consultation period, before the final is adopted later this year."

The Draft Community Local Law will be on public exhibition on Baw Baw Connect from Friday 7 June until Friday 5 July. In addition to having your say online, Council officers will also be out and about at three different events in the next month, so people can give their feedback in person. These events are the Warragul Farmers Market on Saturday 15 June, the Drouin Farmers Market on Saturday 15 June, and the Yarragon Market on Saturday 22 June.

Epacris impressa Common Heath is the Victorian Flora Emblem and out in flower during winter. Around Jindivick the colour tends to be deep pink almost red.

Good examples of this are at Nangara reserve.

Lower in the Catchment, even at Labertouche, is the white variety. At Rokeby there are mixed colours which may be an interaction of different soil types.

Honeyeater birds, particularly the eastern spinebill, feed upon the nectar of the flowers.

Be aware that the invasive weed Spanish heath, is also in flower and easily misidentified for the native heath.

Spanish Heath Erica Iusitanica

Origin: Western Europe Highly flammable and declared a noxious weed in Tasmania the leaves occur together in worls of three or four at the stem nodes, small, green and relatively narrow 4-7mm long c.0.5mm wide. The flowers are pendulous clusters of 2-4 on the ends of very short side branchlets and vary from white to pinkish.

Tasks Market Coordinator.... Work with group to make sure a sooth running of the market, putting out road signs on Sunday before market and picking up after market on the Saturday.

- Stall holders.... All things to do with stalls, contact stall holders before markets, allocation of stall sites, collect fees and other information (insurance). Saturday morning (early) meet stall holders and show were to set up
- .. Set up FRIDAY... mark out stall places inside and out, put out tables and chairs where needed, bollards down, rubbish bins, BBQ and table out for CFA.
- ..Pack up SATURDAY... clean up stall set up, table chairs away, bollards up and rubbish bins emptied. SET UP PACK UP COULD BE ONE.
